ENTRY IN THE SCHEDULE OF MONUMENTS

The monument known as Culnacraigh, hut circle 450m NNW of comprises the remains of a circular house (a hut circle) measuring 10.5m in diameter between the centres of a grass covered wall 2m thick, situated in a clearing in a forestry plantation. The area to be scheduled measures 30m in diameter and consists of the hut circle and an area around it in which traces of activities associated with its construction and use will survive. The monument, which lies in the Parish of Knockbain and the County of Ross and Cromarty as shown outlined in red on the Plan annexed and executed as relative hereto and which forms part of the subjects described in the

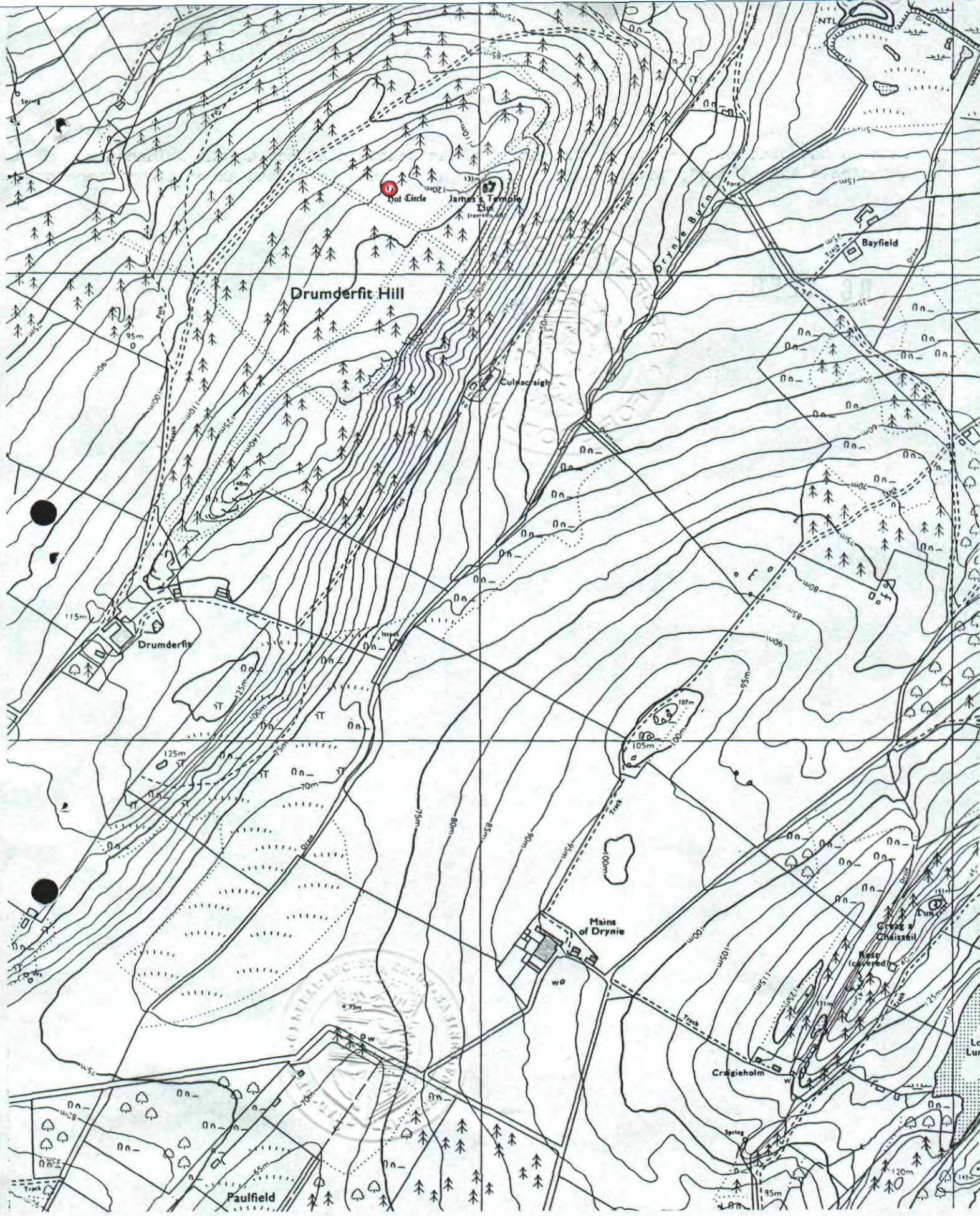

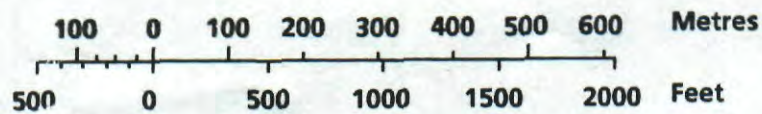
