1. Decision

Remove: Remove building from the List.

2. Designation Background and Development Proposals

2.1 Designation Background

Barnes Castle or Barney Vaults is a category B building and was listed on 05/00/1971. It is in Haddington parish which was resurveyed on 12/08/1996.

Barnes Castle, The Vaults is also a scheduled monument (SM764). The current entry in the Schedule is dated 18/05/1936.

2.2 Development Proposals

Not checked as part of this project.

3. Assessment

3.1 Assessment information

The building was considered for removal as part of the Dual Designation project. This is a nationwide project to review structures which have in the past been both listed as buildings of special architectural or historic interest and scheduled as monuments of national importance. This 'dual designation' is being phased out and structures are being assigned to being either listed or scheduled depending on their individual circumstances. Removing this dual designation will help to provide clarity for the future management of the sites.

The site was not visited.

The present assessment is desk-based, using available information and has included reference to recent photographs.

3.2 Assessment against designation criteria

An assessment against the Listing criteria was not carried out as the importance of the structure will continue to be recognised through its designation as a scheduled monument.
