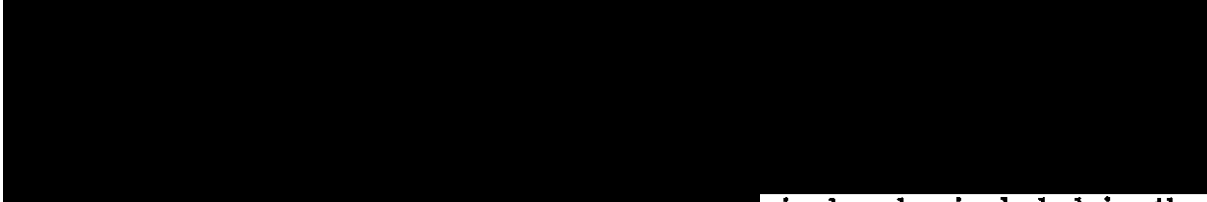

ENTRY IN THE SCHEDULE OF MONUMENTS

The monument known as Rubha Shilddinish, promontory fort and homestead comprises of the remains of a small fortified settlement of Iron Age date situated on a peninsula connected to the mainland on the NW by a narrow strip of land. The area to be scheduled is irregular, measuring a maximum of 120m E-W by 80m N-S, to include the entire peninsula on which the fort is situated. The monument, which lies in the Parish of Stornoway and the County of Ross and Cromarty as shown outlined in red on the Plan annexed and executed as relative hereto and



is hereby included in the Schedule of Monuments appearing to the Secretary of State for Scotland to be of national importance compiled and maintained by him under section 1(1) of the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979.

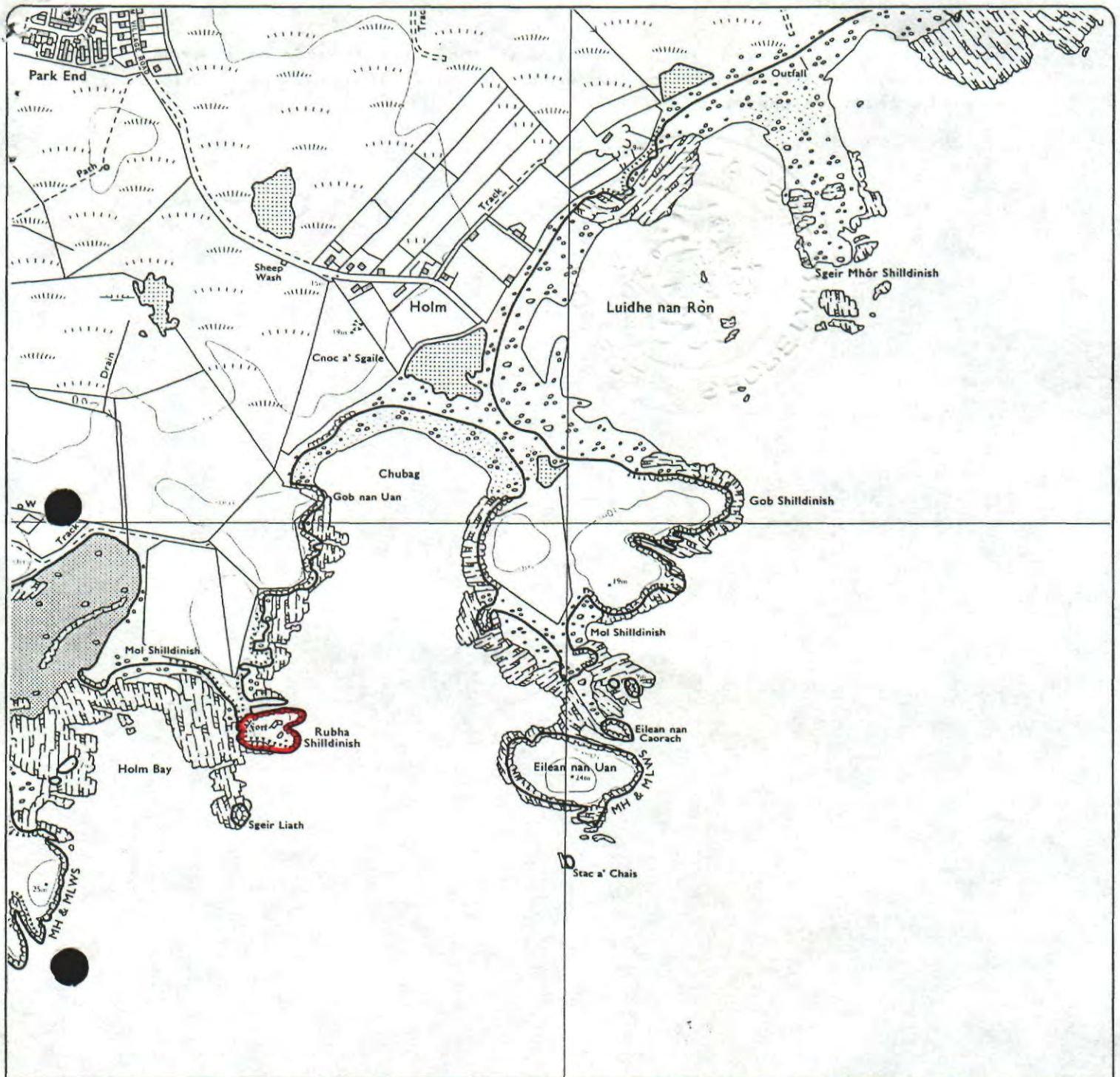


Scheduled area
