

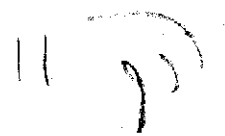

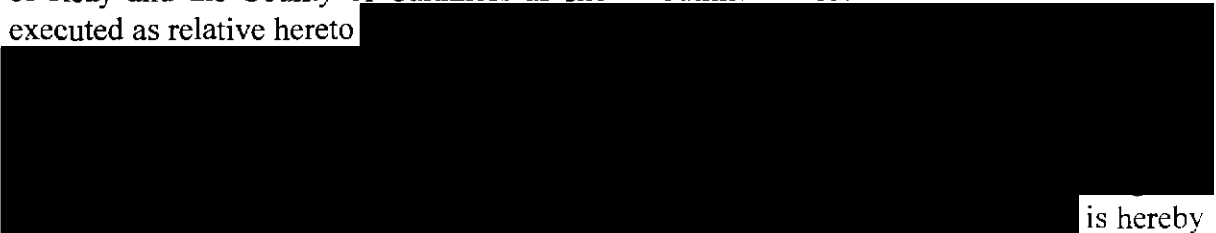

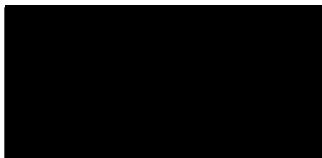
THE ANCIENT MONUMENTS AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL AREAS ACT 1979
ENTRY IN THE SCHEDULE OF MONUMENTS

The monument known as Dounreay Castle comprises the remains of a castle and the site of its barmkin, or attached enclosure and associated ranges. The area to be scheduled is irregular in shape, measuring a maximum of 50m E-W by a maximum of 62m N-S. The N edge is defined by the Mean High Water Mark, the W edge by the bank of the burn or water outflow, and the S and SE edges lie parallel with and 3m from the security fence surrounding the Dounreay research establishment. The monument, which lies in the Parish of Reay and the County of Caithness as shown outlined in red on the Plan annexed and executed as relative hereto



is hereby included in the Schedule of Monuments appearing to the Secretary of State for Scotland to be of national importance compiled and maintained by him under section 1(1) of the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979.

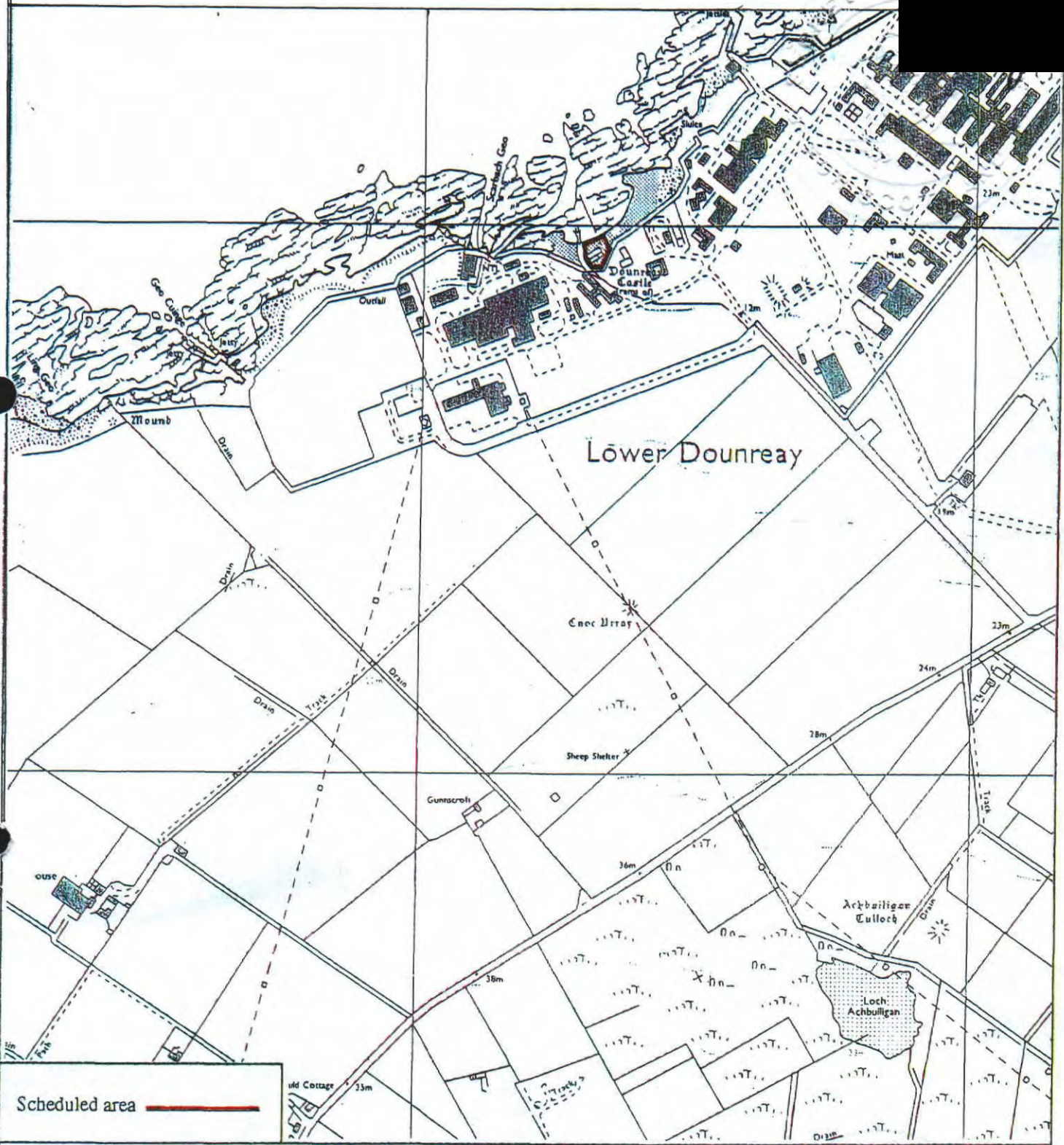


Scheduled area
