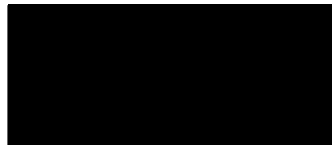

THE ANCIENT MONUMENTS AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL AREAS ACT 1979
ENTRY IN THE SCHEDULE OF MONUMENTS

The monument known as Fortrose Cathedral comprises the remains of Fortrose Cathedral, seat of the diocese of Ross from the 13th Century until the Reformation, together with its surrounding burial ground. The area to be scheduled is irregular in shape, measuring a maximum of 130m NW-SE by 80m. It includes the Cathedral, its burial ground and its enclosing wall, together with further open areas which may retain evidence for the larger burial ground which surrounded the Cathedral before post-Reformation encroachments, and for its method of enclosure. The scheduling excludes all lairs for which rights of burial still exist and the surfaces of modern paved roads within the scheduled area. The monument, which lies in the Parish of Rosemarkie and the County of Ross and Cromarty as shown outlined in red on the Plan annexed and executed as relative hereto [REDACTED]

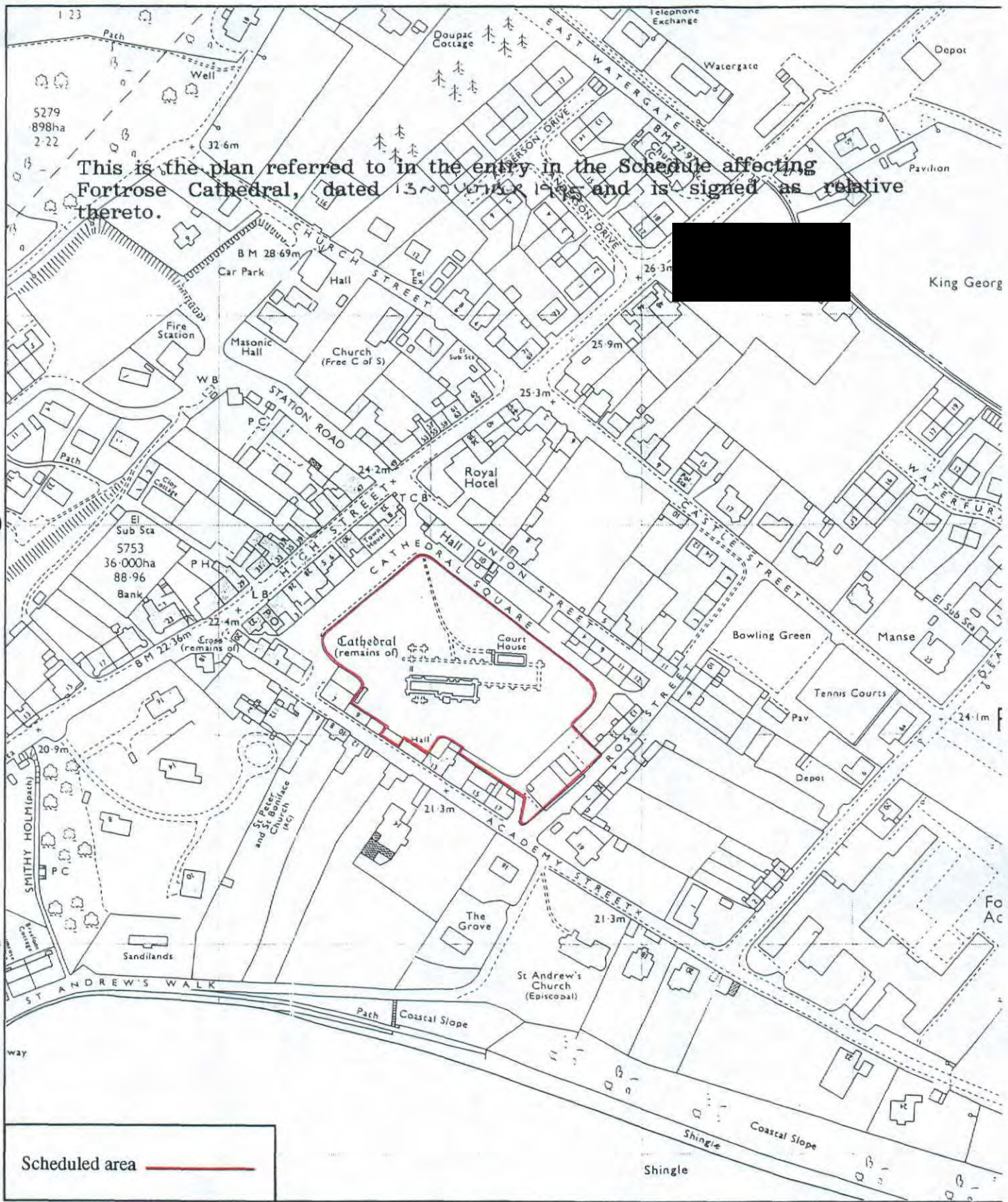
